



Let the Adventures Begin!

Geodes are common in the Mississippian dolostones of Kentucky and Tennessee; however their origins are a mystery. In an abstract: Mineralogy Formation of Geodes in the Mississippian Salem & Warsaw Formation, South -Central Kentucky & Northern Tennessee by SMITH, N. Adam and SIEWERS, Fredrick D., {Dept. of Geography and Geology, Western Kentucky Univ.} it was noted that there are three types of geodes which occur in the Salem & Warsaw Formation: geodes with completely siliceous interiors; with entirely calcitic interiors and geodes with a combination of calcitic and siliceous interiors. The outer shell of all the geodes were chalcedony. Some geodes displayed inclusions of pyrite in the outer shell and inclusions of anhydrite in the interior. Pyrite indicates precipitation from anoxic marine waters (waters depleted of dissolved oxygen) and anhydrite from evaporitic brines.

It is believed that the geodes formed in a shallow burial environment as nodules of anhydrite, which later altered to calcite and/or silica. Other evidence supporting a shallow-burial environment of geode formation includes soft-sediment deformation of strata surrounding geodes and the spherical shape of the geodes themselves. These characteristics both suggest that initial formation of geodes took place before the surrounding sediments were lithified and that formation was influenced by hydrostatic pressure.

WILDACRES SPRING CLASSES - May 18 24, 2015. Speaker-in-Residence: Bob Jones

Class & Instructor	Description				
Beading and Findings Mia Schulman	Knotting is back. You will learn how to make a knotted bead necklace as well as how to identify and properly use "findings" such as jump rings and clasps. If time permits you can also make a bracelet and/or earrings to match. 2-day class offered first semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Knitted Wire and Bead Bracelet Mia Schulman	Don't worry, you don't have to know how to knit. These bracelets are stunning and people are always surprised when told they are knitted. 2-day class offered second semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Cabochons – Basic Bernie Emery	Learn to transform a piece of rock into a shiny, well-formed cabochon. You will learn the use of the trim saw as well as basics of grinding, sanding and polishing. Slabs are provided or students may use their own with approval of the instructor. Please bring an apron and safety glasses. 2-day class offered first semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Cabochons - Intermediate Bernie Emery	Learn to cut different shapes and the techniques needed to do so. Slabs are provided or students may use their own with approval of the instructor. Please bring an apron and safety glasses. Prerequisite: Students must have prior experience with cabbing and use of the trim saw. 2-day class offered second semester.				
Chainmaille – Basic Roger Campbell	Learn the ancient art of chainmaille using non-soldered copper jumprings. Students will learn different weaves while completing class projects. All tools will be provided. An optivisor or other magnification would be helpful. 2-day class offered first semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Chainmaille – Continued Roger Campbell	The 2nd semester class will be a short review of chainmaille and students will learn additional weaves. All tools will be provided. An Optivisor® or other magnification would be helpful.				
Faceting Larry Heath	Students will learn to cut and polish a 57-facet round brilliant gemstone. In addition, they will learn how to identify well-cut stones, select rough material and see whether or not they enjoy this fascinating aspect of the hobby. Students are asked to bring an Optivisor (#7 or #9) and an apron. 4-day class. No prior experience necessary.				
Fused Glass — Advanced Becky Edmundson	Students will learn to use a wet saw to cut shapes, a grinder to smooth the glass, and a jewler's bit to cut a channel in the piece before it is fire polished in a kiln. You should expect to complete a minimum of two pieces. Students are asked to bring safety glasses and, if you own them, a glass cutter and breaking pliers. No prior experience necessary. 2-day class offered first semester. Note: The advanced class is offered before the basic class for fused glass because more firing time is required for the more complex pieces.				
Fused Glass – Basic Becky Edmundson	Fused glass is the art of cutting and layering pieces of glass and then firing them in a kiln. Dichroic coated glass gives a 3-D look. Students will learn the basics of cutting and firing the glass and will complete at least two pieces of jewelry. Students are asked to bring safety glasses and, if you own them, a glass cutter and breaking pliers. 2-day class offered second semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Photographing Small Mineral Specimens — Bruce Gaber	Students will learn to set up, light and photograph small mineral specimens to show off their beauty. 2-day class offered first semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Modern Macrophotography Bruce Gaber	The natural world is often at its most wonderful when viewed – and photographed – with magnification. Minerals, flowers, insects, all can reveal dramatic beauty in the space of moderate Magnification. We will learn the tools and techniques to be photographic explorers of this space. In addition to lens selection, lighting, and of course choice of appropriate subjects, we will use state-of-the-art digital techniques such as focus stacking and high dynamic range imaging. And we'll have a lot of fun while we're at it. 2-day class offered second semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Basics of Scrimshaw Sandra Brady	Scrimshaw, a folk art dating back centuries, is a special form of engraving applied to ivory and similar materials. This course offers an excellent way to begin traditional scrimshaw. Working with a hand scribe you will learn attractive shading techniques and how to work on both natural and man-made materials. You will also learn basic composition and tool sharpening, as well as transfer methods for those who are "drawing challenged." An optivisor or other magnification is recommended. 2 day course offered first semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Scrimshaw – Color Basics Sandra Brady	Building on the methods taught in the first semester, students will be introduced to color. Again, working on both natural and man-made materials, modern scrimshaw methods utilizing the beauty of color will be explored. Preservation of your art work will be included. Bring an optivisor. 2-day course offered second semester. Prerequisite: Basics of Scrimshaw.				
Silversmithing - Basic Richard Meszler	Have fun learning the basics of working silver sheet and wire to fabricate jewelry. The projects will introduce you to annealing and bending/shaping/texturing metal, soldering, piercing and polishing. 2-day class offered 1st semester. No prior experience necessary.				
Silversmithing – Intermediate Richard Meszler	Continue your education working with metals by doing a more complex project. You will learn to make a bezel and ball in which you will set a cabochon to make a pendant. 2-day class offered second semester. Prerequisite: Basic silversmithing experience including soldering.				
Wirewrapped Jewelry Jacolyn Campbell	Using pliers, gold-filled or sterling silver wire, assorted beads or gemstones, and a few basic wirecraft techniques, learn how to create your own fashion rings, bracelets, pendants and earrings to add that perfect accent to your jewelry wardrobe or to give as gifts. All tools and materials will be provided. #1 - Designed for beginners, participants will make an adjustable ring, two bracelets, a pendant and two pairs of earrings. 2-day class offered first semester. #2 - Designed for those with some experience (or a brave beginner) participants will make a fitted ring, two pairs of earrings, a cabochon pendant and a bracelet. 2-day class offered second semester.
